Oh the weather, it has been a very hot start to the year. Mid to high 30's most days. But where I live at HMAS Stirling – Garden Island WA, is a bit cooler than Perth, year low 30's. Lucky me. I am settling in well and learning the job as I go.

My accommodation is a little small but quite comfortable. There is lots of storage space, small fridge, desk area, king single bed, small balcony (with a wonderful view) and an ensuite.

The block is old style reddy/orange built maybe early 70's. It has 16 rooms, 8 on the bottom and 8 on the first level. My room is on the first level hence the view. There are bigger rooms on offer but the views are not as nice or no view at all (car parks and asphalt). The block has its own laundry with 2 washing machines and 2 dryers. Iron and ironing board were provided in the room. Meals are provided in the mess about a 3-minute walk. Which is good, as it makes me get out of the room.




The island is joined by a bridge to the mainland, and it takes 4 minutes by car to cross. Bringing plants and animals onto the island is prohibited.

Garden Island is also a national park, being a haven for birds and the rare tammar wallaby. It is also known to have carpet pythons and tiger snakes. So far, I have only seen a python, and yes, my heart was racing. The island is home to King skinks, which are much the same as blue tongues but longer and black. There is also a little penguin colony. I haven't seen the penguins yet.




Building Refurbishment Project

ANZAC March and Service-Sunday 21st April 2024 – The Stories behind the legend



Making a difference to the experiences of our Veterans' Terry Black OAM and Regula (Reg) Black OAM

I Terry Black OAM was a young man who had no idea of what the future would bring when I joined AMP in 1965 as a callow youth aged 16. After a few years I was required to register

for National Service and "won" the ballot. After Army recruit training I was allocated to the Royal Corps of Australian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers (RAEME). Conscription was a lifechanging event, ultimately involving 12-months active service in Vietnam. On discharge,

I returned to AMP and spent 40 years in various roles, mainly involved with the superannuation and financial planning sector. I am a Life Member of the AMP Advisers Association, having been involved as Secretary and President and a 15-year sub-committee role involving regular meetings in Sydney negotiating with AMP management. I met Reg shortly after my discharge and we married in 1972, two years after my return from Vietnam and two weeks after Reg Black OAM graduated from Teachers' College.

Reg's passion for education led to further studies at Melbourne University where she obtained her Bachelor of Education degree then a Post-Graduate Diploma in Special Education whilst working full time in mainstream education. Reg's Special Education career continued until 2006 when she retired due to work-related injuries. Subsequent spinal surgeries caused nerve damage in her legs and a dropped foot. I too retired early due to health issues, since resolved.

During our working careers we were both active volunteers on various committees and with other organisations, and achieved great satisfaction in those roles. I had been asked by one of my superannuation clients whether she had enough capital to retire. During my fact finding, it emerged that she had been married to an older WW2 veteran who had since died. His history suggested that we should apply for a War Widow's pension from DVA, which was granted 8 days after lodgement. This single event made me realise the power of advocacy. As a direct result of this experience, I joined Legacy and remain active.

Our involvement in the RSL (since 1970) became our social network and soon became much more. I was coerced into a committee role as Secretary and spent 10 years negotiating with State branch to ensure the viability of our Sub-Branch. I was also on an RSL State Sub-Committee for many years and mentored other RSL's experiencing trading or committee difficulties.

Prior to each ANZAC Day and Remembrance Day, schools in our area were invited to the RSL to meet Veterans, to learn about the veterans' experiences and life during and after their service and learning about Australia's commitment to world peace and lessons learned. I and a few others represented Vietnam during these sessions. Reg was also asked to sell raffle tickets on a Friday night, the ubiquitous meat raffle.

On one of these evenings, she was asked to assist with the taking of minutes at a Women's' Auxiliary meeting - her first introduction to the work of the Auxiliary and she was very quickly voted in as Secretary. Reg organises many fundraising events, from Opera on the Hill and other RSL days, raising much needed funds for veterans. She also organises an annual Christmas lunch and a mid-year lunch for the local community, raising further funds for Veterans and their families. Through this work she was named RSL Club Person of the Year in 2010. She was awarded Life membership of the National RSL Women's Auxiliary in 2019.

I undertake the organisation of the annual Long Tan dinners, sourcing guest speakers and am MC on the evening. Funds from these evenings are donated to various organisations including ward 17 at Austin Health, where many veterans are in great need of medical and

psychological support. I remain active with Legacy (supported by Reg) and ultimately had 60 legacy widows under my care – although their numbers are diminishing - providing them with support to claim pensions and assistance through DVA, to enable them to live independently.

I became a JP in 1999, as this helped facilitate the paperwork necessary for their claims and was available to other Legatees for this purpose. Together, we delivered Christmas gifts to these widows each year ensuring that they were aware of services Legacy provides. As we've gotten older, I now send a Christmas letter to each. We are also involved in the Anzac Day badge appeal and the Poppy appeal and with the community Commemorations conducted locally on ANZAC and Remembrance days.

Reg and her sister-in law, Donna, have made all the wreaths laid by local organisations for the past 18 years and coordinated the afternoon teas for attendees after the services. Reg is also committed to the Family Life charity and works as a volunteer in their Op Shop distribution warehouse two days a week and assists with their monthly Saturday sale.

We have worked side by side complimenting each other and we feel we have a mutual purpose in contributing towards and making a difference in our community through awareness and care. We often reflect on how a society like ours would function without the many millions of volunteer hours contributed across the country.

On Australia Day 2018, I was awarded an OAM for my contribution to Veterans and their families. In 2021 Reg was awarded an OAM in the Queen's Birthday list for her contribution to the Veteran community. These awards made us quite proud and we are active participants in Order of Australia Association VIC Branch events.

The OAA VIC Branch thanks Terry and Reg for looking after Ralph Butcher OAM when he attends lunches with them. Ralph is 105.


Member News

This is just one story of what the USN is currently up to in our region.

US Pacific Fleet to stand up second unmanned surface vessel squadron this year

The head of US Pacific Fleet today said his command plans to establish its second operational unmanned surface vessel squadron in May, though he kept tight-lipped about what "exquisite capabilities" might be available to the unit.

"This is a uniform capability that we'll be able to own, operate... [and] can be employed within particular spaces," Adm. Samuel Paparo told an audience here at West 2024 in San Diego. A "principal element within warfare is the element of operational security. So, our most exquisite capabilities, if I am doing my job, you won't [know] about it." Paparo also said that in March his fleet would conduct Integrated Battle Problem 24.1. IBP has been a series of naval experimentation events, initiated by former Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Michael Gilday and conducted annually.

The standing up of another unmanned surface vessel squadron in US Pacific Fleet is latest move by the larger Navy to boost the presence of unmanned vessels throughout the fleet. Paparo noted previous IBPs have seen unmanned vessels log thousands of miles at sea over a period of several months.

Paparo also said that IBP is meant to complement rather than compete with other unmanned efforts taking place at <u>US 5th Fleet</u> in the Arabian Gulf, home of Task Force 59, or US 4th Fleet in South America, where Navy leadership <u>formally introduced</u> a cadre of unmanned vessel experts to the command's staff last year.

Separately, on Tuesday, Marine Corps Lt. Gen. Karsten Heckl told reporters his service would soon test a new unmanned drone designed to stealthily carry two Naval Strike Missiles to Marines ashore without attracting attention.

Heckl did not name the company that produces the drone, except to call them a "mom and pop" shop. He did say the vessels were exceedingly difficult to track because of the minimal wake the vessels produce while gliding through the water.

The Marines expect to test the new drone this month as part of Army-led Project Convergence events.
