The LONE PINE – PLANTING AND DEDICATION SAT24AUG19

A week prior to the Beaumaris RSL Community ANZAC Commemorative March and Service, on SUN22APR18, the large Banksia Tree, that stood behind the Cenotaph in the Beaumaris Community Memorial Forecourt, dropped a huge branch.

A thorough inspection by the Arborist showed that the tree was not in good condition and could be a threat to the community. It was completely removed and replaced with 5 small wattles to help make the site look reasonable for the ANZAC Service, that was to take place only days later.

After the Service, which had over 750 people present, a local resident, Mr Chris Sutton, who is Convenor of the Friends of Beaumaris Reserve and a member of the Beaumaris RSL, suggested to the Mayor of the day, Cr Laurie Evans, that a genuine Lone Pine would be a most suitable replacement for the Banksia. Councillor Evans asked me write to him by email to confirm our conversation.

After one or two short delays, due to uncertainties about redevelopment of the adjacent sports club, the council decided it was time to proceed.

Mr Chris Sutton very kindly sourced a genuine Lone Pine with the correct lineage, from Canberra and offered to present it to the Beaumaris RSL, so that it could be planted with due ceremony, by His Worship the Mayor, Councillor Michael Heffernan and dedicated by the Club Chaplain, Rev Bill Pugh, on behalf of the Beaumaris Community.

It is nearly 60 years since the then City of Sandringham, set aside the land and built the Beaumaris Community Memorial Forecourt and Cenotaph and indeed the Beaumaris Reserve.

Over those years, many of our community who served in the Navy, Army and Air Force, have paid tribute at this Cenotaph, to their mates who did not return. As the years go by and their numbers thin, it is their children who come here to remember their relatives.

It is pleasing to see the interest shown by the youth of today who attend our local ANZAC March and Service and Remembrance Service. each year.

As well as representation from all our local schools, there are Cubs, Scouts, Venturers, Rover Scouts and Cadets who are attending in increasing numbers. These people are our future and it is they who will keep the ANZAC spirit alive and carry it into the future.

The LONE PINE – PLANTING AND DEDICATION SAT 24 AUG 19

Beaumaris RSL Sub Branch - President's Speech

The **Lone Pine** was a solitary **tree** on the Gallipoli Peninsula in Turkey, which marked the site of the Battle of **Lone Pine** in 1915. ... **Pines** which are planted as a memorial to the Australian and New Zealand soldiers who fought in Gallipoli are also **known as** "**Lone Pines**" or "Gallipoli **Pines**".

The attack was planned as a diversion for the Australian and New Zealand units that were to breakout from the Anzac perimeter by capturing the heights of Chunuk Bair and Hill 971. At 5.30 pm on 6 August 1915, the Australian artillery barrage lifted and from concealed trenches in no man's land the 1st Australian Brigade charged towards the Turkish trenches.

The troops paused on reaching the Turkish trenches, finding that many were covered by timber roofs. Some fired, bombed and bayoneted from above, some found their way inside and others ran on past to the open communications and support trenches behind. Others advanced as far as "the Cup" which was where Turkish support units were located and from where the Turks counterattacked.

By nightfall, most of the enemy front line was in Australian hands and outposts had been established in former Turkish communication trenches. The Australian Engineers dug a safe passage across no man's land so that reinforcements could enter the captured positions without being exposed to Turkish fire.

Having captured the Turkish trenches, the Australians now tried to hold what they had taken while the Turks desperately and determinedly tried to throw the Australians out.

From nightfall on 6 August until the night of 9 August a fierce battle ensued underground in the complex maze of Turkish tunnels. The Australians succeeded in drawing the whole of the immediate Turkish reserve. Six Australian battalions suffered nearly 2,300 killed and wounded at Lone Pine. Seven Australians were awarded the Victoria Cross, the highest number ever awarded to an Australian division for one action.

Lone Pine Cemetery is the location of the Memorial to the Missing in the Anzac area of Gallipoli and is situated on the ground captured by the Australians during the battle. It commemorates 4,224 Australians who have no known grave. There are 652 Australians buried at Lone Pine cemetery

For those here today it is probably quite obvious why the Beaumaris RSL supports the planting of a Lone Pine that has linage to the original Lone Pine at Gallipoli.

The Gallipoli campaign for Australia ended all romantic ideas of heading off overseas on an adventure of a 'life time' to fight for our mother Country. It did not take long for the word to spread on the horrific causalities that were mounting. Then came the return of the wounded with tales of living in the trenches of the Gallipoli Peninsular.

Most of us here know what happened over the next four years. From a population of fewer than five million, 416,809 men enlisted, of which over 60,000 were **killed** and 156,000 wounded, gassed, or taken prisoner. It is now understood that almost all of the 416,000 men who served Europe came home with what is now known as PTSD then known as Shell Shock.

Virtually every family in Australia during the 1920's was dealing with someone severely affected by WW1. There is plenty of evidence many families are still being influenced by the trauma of WW1 and how the men tried to live their lives again.

So the Beaumaris RSL vision for the Lone Pine and plaque is to provoke people remember what happened and most importantly to never let it happen again.
